



The Health Pooled Fund (HPF): 12 years of providing life-saving healthcare for the citizens of South Sudan


Key facts about HPF



Goal: Since 2012, HPF delivers improved health and wellbeing for the population of South Sudan, specifically a reduction in maternal deaths and deaths of children under 5.



Geographical Reach: To achieve this, the programme supported health facilities across **8** States of South Sudan and over **4,400** Boma Health Workers delivering health services in over **746** Bomas in **55** counties (including Unity State). Since 2022, it supports **7** States.





Implementing Partners: The HPF consortium is led by Crown Agents, supported by Montrose, the International Procurement Agency (IPA) and **9** implementing partners.

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Funders: The programme is funded by six donors, led by FCDO. Other donors include USAID, the EU, Canada, GAVI and SIDA.

The HPF approach

HPF is biggest healthcare programme in South Sudan and has provided support to 8 states and over 1,000 health facilities over the last 12 years. Since 2022, it supports 7 States.

Activities included:

- Ensuring regular supply of medicines in HPF supported health facilities.
- Building the capacity of staff at HPF supported health facilities.
- Discouraging home births towards safe deliveries in facilities.
- Engaging with communities in 746 Bomas (including Unity State), including to treat children under the age of five years, refer patients to health facilities and raise health awareness.
- Increasing the number of medical consultations for children, including the provision of treatment for illnesses such as malaria, diarrhoea, and pneumonia.
- Supporting the Ministry of Health to improve health records.

The results at a glance



Procured, transported and delivered medicines across 8 States of South Sudan*

- Procured, stored and distributed **22** consignments of life-saving drugs worth **£2 million** each.
- Set up a procurement and logistics system that consistently delivered three consignments of medicines each year.
- Maintained services despite the outbreak of armed conflict and floods making 80% of the country's road network inaccessible.



Maternal Health

- Increased the coverage of safe deliveries at health facilities from 16.2% in 2011 to 53.4% in 2023.
- Increased the uptake of initial antenatal care visits by **86.4%** between 2011 and 2023.



Child health

- Facilitated **21,786,865** medical consultations for children under five between 2012 and 2023.
- Increased the average number of health facility visits by children under five from **1,087** per health facility in 2011 to 3,574 in 2023.



- Vaccinated 2,470,028 children under 1 year with the 3rd pentavalent/DPT3 vaccine from 2013 to 2023.
- Reduced vaccination drop-out rate from 20% to 12% between 2011 and 2023.
- Increased DPT 3 vaccine coverage from 19.5% to 43% between 2011 and 2023.



- Distributed over **£1 million** of gloves, gowns, masks and medicines.
- Immunised **1,698,533** adults.



- Trained **4,400** Boma health workers to diagnose and treat illnesses in communities and refer community members to the nearest health facility.
- Improved community understanding of health and hygiene, communicable diseases, gender and social inclusion issues and health-seeking behaviour.



 Increased proportion of facilities reporting in DHIS has increased from 51% in 2019 to 99.9% in 2023.
